




FY22 PROGRAM REVENUE AND EXPENSES BY CATEGORY



MENTORING

















New Opportunities has mentoring programs in Audubon, Carroll, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties. Each of the mentoring programs pair an at-risk child with an adult from the community. The adult serves as an additional support system for the child. The mentor and mentee spend time together each month doing low or no cost activities. Mentoring relationships are a shared opportunity for learning and growth. The rewards gained for mentoring is substantial for both mentees and mentors. Mentoring offers you the power to transform lives and make a difference. Spending as little as an hour a week with a young person can make a difference in their life and yours. All it takes is one caring person to a make a difference in the life of a child. Be a mentor. Change a life.



The New Opportunities I-Smile Program provided 2,874 oral services to 793 unduplicated children during 2022 to children residing in Audubon, Carroll and Guthrie counties. Those services included 880 dental screenings, and 736 fluoride varnishes. Our Dental Hygienist provide dental services at WIC clinics, preschools, Head Starts and in the area schools. We provide these dental services with an emphasis in prevention and education from newborns all the way through middle school students. We also offer dental screenings, fluoride varnish, and oral health education to expecting and postpartum mothers.

I-Smile @ School Program provides dental screenings, dental sealants, fluoride varnish, and oral health education for elementary and middle school students. For school aged children, 80% - 90% of tooth decay or cavities occur on the chewing surfaces of the molar (back) teeth. Placing dental sealants on these teeth greatly lowers the chance that those teeth will get tooth decay. Our Sealant Program provides screening services to the following schools: Adair-Casey, Audubon, Carroll-Fairview, Coon I-Smile -Rapids-Bayard, Exira-Elk Horn-Kimballton, IKM-Manning, Panorama and West Central Valley-@ School Stuart. 111 students received sealants in 2022, with a total of 305 sealants placed.

Our 8th Annual Children's Health Clinic was held on August 9, 2022 at New Opportunities Central Office. We had the pleasure of seeing 78 children, serving 46 families and provided 226 services. The Health Services Department partners with local providers and professionals to offer free health screenings, school physicals, dental screenings, vision screenings, immunizations, lead testing, and developmental screenings. The clinic is offered shortly before area schools return from their summer break to help parents meet all the school requirements before their student starts school.





HEAD START

The New Opportunities Head Start program is funded to serve **247 children** within the seven-county service area of Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Dallas, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties. Head Start provides eligible three and four year-olds with free preschool that features active learning experiences, nutritious snacks and meals, health, mental health, and dental services, and family services.

Family Development & Self-Sufficiency (FaDSS) Program

Partnership with their FaDSS Family Development Specialist who works with the whole family to address their basic needs, improve child wellbeing, and develop careers opportunities that, in turn,

IMPROVES LIVES, FAMILIES, AND COMMUNITIES.

The New Opportunities FaDSS Program began providing services to families July 1, 2022. It is funded to serve 42 families in the six-county service area of Audubon, Boone, Carroll, Dallas, Greene, and Guthrie Counties. The FaDSS Program offers a variety of activities to support the needs of each family. These activities include, but are not limited to:

- home visits
- goal-setting
- assessments
- referrals to community resources

PREVENTION

Tobacco Use Prevention and Control

The Iowa Department of Public Health Division of Tobacco Use Prevention and Control works to reduce tobacco use and the toll of tobacco-caused disease and death by preventing youth from starting, helping adults and youth to quit, and preventing exposure to secondhand smoke.

To achieve these goals, the Division follows Centers for Disease Prevention and Control (CDC) guidelines for comprehensive tobacco control programs. State-level initiatives include Quitline Iowa cessation services, youth tobacco-use prevention programming and enforcement of Iowa's Smokefree Air Act.

Local tobacco control programs, called Community Partnerships, support tobacco control initiatives at the community level by partnering with local county coalition groups on policy changes including Audubon, Carroll, Greene, Guthrie, Sac, Buena Vista, Ida, Crawford, Shelby and Monona Counties.







Iowa Students for Tobacco Education and Prevention (ISTEP)

Is a statewide network of youth in Iowa, which includes an Executive Council of youth members including a President, Vice President, Secretary, three voting Tobacco Use Prevention and Control Commission members, and an open statewide membership to all Iowa youth in grades 7-12. ISTEP was started by high school students who were tired of tobacco hurting them and their families. Those teens, saw that tobacco and e-cigarette or vape hurts families and lives. We believe our lives and bodies are Worth Fighting For and we choose to be tobacco free.

New Opportunities continued supporting ISTEP chapters at Carroll High School (KINS), Coon Rapids, Panorama 5th grade and started chapters at Greene County School, East Sac School, Whiting, Paton-Churdan and IKM-Manning.

EARLY HEAD START

The New Opportunities Early Head Start Program is funded to serve 27 expectant mothers and children age birth to three within the four county service area of Carroll, Dallas, Greene, and Guthrie Counties. Early Head Start is a home based visitation program; each enrolled participant receives a weekly home visit and two opportunities each month for socialization with other participants.

The content of each home visit focuses on assisting parents in being their child's first and best teacher. Enrolled participants in Early Head Start receive the same comprehensive services as those in Head Start with all services provided in the home or at socializations.

In addition to home based, New Opportunities, Inc. received an Early Head Start grant in 2019 that provides center-based services to 64 children in Dallas County and Carroll County. The program operates facilities in Carroll and Perry. The Early Head Start centers provide every enrolled child with developmentally appropriate learning experiences, nutritious snacks and meals, health, mental health, and dental services as well as services for the whole family. Children attend the center five days per week, twelve months per year.

DEVELOPMENT

FY22 Outreach Projects

New Opportunities Outreach Offices in Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Dallas, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties offer hope and encouragement for low-income families to succeed through available resources throughout the year.

Making a Difference: A single mom with 2 boys that had just relocated to Carroll and needed help with transportation, job hunting and local resources. RoAnn, Carroll County Outreach Coordinator was able to connect her with New Opportunities programs (LIHEAP, Toys, Christmas decorations, and taxi vouchers). The mom was able to meet with Connie from DMACC at toy pick up and start the school program to assist in education for CNA job!

1425 Households received a food package



Food packages are offered seasonally, provided through local community support. Pictured is the Guthrie Outreach Coordinator Rhonda Huggins. She hosts an annual "Souper Bowl" event. For each can donated, the Guthrie County State Bank matched with a monetary donation. She was able to collected 600 cans of soup.

Disaster Assistance

When the Governor releases a proclamation of disaster activating the Iowa Individual Assistance Grant Program, it activates New Opportunities, the Community Action Agency, serving the disaster-affected counties to provide Disaster Case Management services.

On 12/15/21, Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac counties were issued a disaster proclamation due to the Derecho.

On 6/14/22, Greene County was issued a disaster proclamation due to flooding.



New Opportunities Behavioral Health Department continues to serve five counties: Audubon, Carroll, Guthrie, Greene & Sac.

The Behavioral Health Department is currently involved with the Integrated Provider Network (IPN). The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) Substance Use and Problem Gambling Services IPN is a statewide, community-based, resiliency- and recovery-oriented system of care for substance use and problem gambling services. IDPH selected Integrated Provider Network contractors in 2018, through a competitive request for proposal process that evaluated applicant capability and experience to: Educate the public, Assess local needs, Understand state and national policy, Inform and collaborate with each other and with stakeholders, Reduce stigma, Prevent substance use and gambling problems, Intervene with at-risk or in-need persons and populations, Provide effective treatment, and Support early remission and long term recovery.

State Opioid Response (SOR)

The Iowa Department of Public Health uses SAMHSA's Opioid SOR grant funds to support prevention, treatment, and recovery support activities. The State Opioid Response in Iowa project will further expand capacity of the existing regional prevention and treatment provider network with a focus on building access for all Iowans in need. An updated community assessment specific to opioids and involving local stakeholders will continue the momentum for implementation of evidence-based practices, including medication assisted treatment (MAT). The focus of this project is to increase community capacity for a successful local response to the opioid

crisis through the following goals:

- Increase awareness of opioid risks through statewide prevention efforts
- See The Person media campaign

Problem Gambling Services

- Your Life Iowa Media Campaign and service promotion.
- Responsible Gambling efforts with community partners.

Treatment Services offered:

- A free, initial screening quickly assesses the severity of gambling use and identifies the appropriate level of treatment through individual and group therapy.
- Recovery Support Services (RSS) to help patients pay for basic necessities (i.e. gas and clothing)
- Financial Coaching to assist patients in addressing their financial needs related to their gambling behaviors, including assessment of a patients' financial status, establishing a budget/debt payment plan, discussing financial debt options, and creating a money management plan for the future.

UTILITY ASSISTANCE

Utility assistance is offered in all seven counties through the Outreach Centers. Utility assistance includes Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and crisis assistance for families facing utility disconnections.

LIHEAP is a federally-funded program that has been established to help qualifying low-income lowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter heating season. By doing so, households can reduce the risk of health and safety problems—such as illness, fire or eviction. The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel, and type of housing. In an attempt to reach all qualifying households in FY2022, New Opportunities provides multiple ways for households to apply within our 7 counties. In addition to applying at the local outreach office, family can apply online, by mail or e/mail. The 7 outreach offices also offers mobile LIHEAP clinics to reach clients that are not able to drive to their local outreach office.



In Fiscal Year 2022, New Opportunities paid over \$1.8 million toward the heating costs of 3,516 low-income households!

In Fiscal Year 2022, New Opportunities started a new program called LIHWAP (Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program). The new program served 263 households and \$96,522.00 was paid out in assistance.



Utility Crisis assistance is available to households threatened by disconnection and low fuel, as well as assistance with furnace repair, furnace replacement, and some cooling needs. Households that utilize LIHEAP may be eligible to receive additional crisis assistance.

WEATHERIZATION

New Opportunities Weatherization Department works with low-income families to help reduce their energy usage by improving the energy efficiency of their homes. The weatherization services are of no cost to the families. The Weatherization Department serves eight counties in West-Central Iowa, including:



Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Crawford, Dallas, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties.

In Fiscal Year 2022, the Weatherization Department completed the following in their eight-county service area:

- Replaced 27 water heaters
- Installed 47 smoke alarms

- Installed 23 exhaust fans
- Installed 107 carbon monoxide detectors

HEALTH





Women, Infants, & Children (WIC)) is a supplemental nutrition program for babies, children under the age of 5, pregnant women, breastfeeding women, and women who have had a baby in the last 6 months. In 2022 there were 2,378 women and children that received WIC benefits in our 7-county project area. WIC helps provide healthy foods, nutrition education, and referrals to other healthcare agencies. Our staff enjoys participating in health promotional opportunities with all WIC participants.

149 pregnant and post-partum women were seen through the Maternal Health Program for health education during and after their pregnancies in Audubon, Carroll and Guthrie counties. Staff provided a total of 817 services including: health education, psycho-social counseling and oral health counseling. 90% sought care with their OB provider in the 1st trimester and 63% breastfeed. Maternal Health staff assists with medical and dental assessments, health and nutrition education, screening for depression, plans for delivery, and adjustment issues as their family expands.



Our Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program was in its fifth year of operation during 2022 and we were able to see growth and successes within the program. The Program has two trained Breastfeeding Peer Counselors: Brooke Cressler and Brenna Hodne. Both have been a great addition to our WIC team and truly enjoy mentoring other breastfeeding moms. A WIC mom can reach out to their peer counselor whenever they have questions or concerns regarding breastfeeding. Our Peer Counselors are able to offer a new mom the support she often needs during the early days of breastfeeding. 278 mothers received support from a Peer Counselor.

1,235 unduplicated children ages birth to 21 received services through our Child and Adolescent Health Program during 2022. Staff provided

3,694 services including: lead screening, developmental screening, informing and care coordination activities. 98% of all families reported having a medical home. Our Child Health staff provides assistance with applying for Medicaid or hawk-i health insurance. Staff works with families who are newly eligible for the State Medicaid program to inform them of covered services and to ensure access to regular health care check-ups, dental services, vision screenings and immunizations. Staff work attentively with families to provide support and referral for parenting issues such as behavior, speech development, high family stress and any other area a family may be struggling with.

Community Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program (CAPP) provided 1,126 middle/high school/college students with science-based sexuality

information including having a healthy relationship, preventing unplanned pregnancies, reducing sexually transmitted infections and being safe with social media.
