

### **FY17 PROGRAM REVENUE AND EXPENSES BY CATEGORY**





### HEALTH

### 2017 was a busy year for the Health Department at New Opportunities!

We take pride in participating in a wide variety of community events! We were excited to have been a part of the Audubon County Health & Wellness Fair, 1st Presbyterian Church Easter Egg Hunt, Carroll Fest Health & Safety Fair, Carroll Band Day Parade, Carroll Library Story Walk, Swan Lake Fall Fest, Adel Toddler Fest, Stewart Memorial Community Hospital Fall Fling, and Celebrate Sac County.



The New Opportunities I-Smile Program provided 1,318 dental screenings, 1,162 fluoride varnishes and 72 dental sealants to children in Audubon, Carroll and Guthrie counties. Our Dental Hygienists provide dental services at WIC clinics, preschools, Head Starts and in the area schools. We provide these dental services with an emphasis in prevention and education from newborns all the way through middle school. We also offer dental screenings, fluoride varnish, and oral health education to expecting and postpartum mothers. I-Smile @ School provides dental screenings, dental

sealants, fluoride varnish, and oral health education for elementary and middle school students. For school aged children, 80% - 90% of tooth decay, or cavities, occur on the chewing surfaces of the molar (back) teeth. Placing dental sealants on these teeth greatly lowers the chance that those teeth will get tooth decay. .

Our 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Children's Health Clinic was a huge success! 116 children were recipients of services on August 15, 2017, at New Opportunities in Carroll. The New Opportunities Health Services Department partnered up with several area providers and professionals in the area to offer free health screenings, school physicals, dental screenings, vision screenings, immunizations, lead testing, developmental screenings and haircuts. Individuals were also on-hand with information on area programs and resources to benefit families. The clinic is offered shortly before area schools return from their summer break in an effort

to help parents who are still in need of physicals, dental screening or immunizations before their student starts school.

1<sup>st</sup> Five works to build partnerships with primary care providers in Audubon, Carroll and Guthrie counties. 1st Five supports local healthcare providers in the early detection of social-emotional and developmental delays and family risk-related factors in children birth to 5. 1st Five coordinates referrals, interventions and follow -up, as needed. In FY17 staff provided care coordination to 36 families after receiving a referral from their medical provider, resulting in over 80 community resource connections for the families. Currently 1st Five collaborates with 10 medical clinics in Audubon,

Carroll, and Guthrie Counties.

### **HEAD START**

The New Opportunities Head Start program is funded to serve **247 children** within the seven-county service area of Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Dallas, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties. Head Start provides eligible three- and four-year-olds with free preschool that features active learning experiences, nutritious snacks and meals, health, mental health, and dental services, and family services.

### FINANCIAL LITERACY



New Opportunities mission is to help families reach their highest potential in regard to their personal and economic self-sufficiency.

Offering Financial Literacy education gives families the tools they need to build financial security!

New Opportunities offers Financial Literacy coaching in seven counties—Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll,
Dallas, Greene, Guthrie, and Sac Counties. Financial Literacy is offered at no cost to families.

The Financial Literacy Coach provides one-on-one and group classes on financial management,
budgeting and credit repair for individuals and families.

New Opportunities refers households who seek crisis assistance to meet with the Financial Literacy Coach to set goals and work towards financial stability.

### **Financial Literacy Program FY17**

- Number of individuals who participated in financial education (group setting): 140
- Number of individuals who received financial coaching (one-on-one): 175
- Number of households who completed the financial literacy program: 129

In 2017, New Opportunities was awarded a grant from the Northwest Area Foundation. This grant allowed us to hire an additional staff member as the Financial Literacy Coordinator and to expand our Financial Literacy program! In June of 2017, twenty-one New Opportunities staff members from the Development, Prevention, and Head Start departments received the Four Cornerstones of Financial Literacy training to help staff incorporate Financial Literacy education into our already existing programs. Additionally our Financial Literacy Coordinator works with schools in our seven-county service area to identify financial literacy needs for students and to educate the public on barriers low-income residents are facing.

### **WHAT IS COMMUNITY ACTION?**

Community Action was born when President Lyndon Johnson declared War on Poverty during his 1964 State of the Union Address. Johnson promised to fulfill the promise of equal opportunity for all by enacting several comprehensive changes within the federal government. In August 1964, the Economic Opportunity Act was signed into law by President Johnson, creating the nationwide Community Action Network.

Today, more than 1,000 Community Action Agencies have formed to serve 99% of America's counties!

By 1967, local Community Action Agencies (CAA's) had popped up all over America. In April 1967, two non-profit agencies merged (the first merger of 2 nonprofits in the State of Iowa - Community Action Committee of Carroll, Calhoun, Greene & Sac AND Tri-County Community Action serving Audubon, Guthrie an Dallas Counties), and Community Opportunities, Inc. received its corporate status.

On October 1, 2006, a merger occurred between Community Opportunities, Inc., and New View Substance Abuse Treatment and Prevention Center, creating

New Opportunities, Inc.!

One of the most unique characteristics of Community Action Agencies is the structure of their Board of Directors. Each Community Action Agency is required to have a tripartite board consisting of equal parts of local private sector, public sector, and low-income community representatives. This allows leaders from each sector to come together to develop responses to address the needs of low-income households.

### **PREVENTION**



### **Tobacco Use Prevention and Control**

The Iowa Department of Public Health Division of Tobacco Use Prevention and Control works to reduce tobacco use and the toll of tobacco-caused disease and death by preventing youth from starting, helping adults and youth to quit, and preventing exposure to secondhand smoke.

To achieve these goals, the Division follows Centers for Disease Prevention and Control (CDC) guidelines for comprehensive tobacco control programs. State-level initiatives include Quitline Iowa cessation services, youth tobacco-use prevention programming and enforcement of Iowa's Smokefree Air Act. Local tobacco control programs, called Community Partnerships, support tobacco control initiatives at the community level.

ISTEP is a statewide network of youth in lowa, which includes an Executive Council of youth members including a President, Vice President, Secretary, three voting Tobacco Use Prevention and Control Commission members, and an open statewide membership to all lowa youth in grades 7-12. ISTEP was started by high school students who were tired of tobacco hurting them and their families. Those teens, saw that tobacco hurts families and lives. We believe our lives and bodies are Worth Fighting For and we choose to be tobacco free.

New Opportunities had ISTEP chapters at Carroll High School (KINS), Carroll Middle School ISTEP, Coon Rapids, and Panorama 5th grade.

The New Opportunities Early Head Start Program is funded to serve 36 expectant mothers and children age birth to three within the four county service area of Carroll, Dallas, Greene, and Guthrie Counties. Early Head Start is a home based visitation program within which each enrolled participant receives a weekly home visit and two opportunities each month for socialization with other participants.

The content of each home visit focuses on assisting parents in being their child's first and best teacher. Enrolled participants in Early Head Start receive the same comprehensive services as those in Head Start with all services provided in the home or at socializations.

## New Opportunities Behavioral Health Department continues to service the five counties of Audubon, Carroll, Guthrie, Greene and Sac.

The Behavioral Health Department is currently involved with the Integrated Services Project (ISP). ISP contracts with a substance abuse agency and a domestic violence agency that provides services in a similar services area in Iowa. Currently New Opportunities is working with Family Crisis Centers (FCC) and Centers against Abuse & Sexual Assault (CAASA). New Opportunities, Inc. currently co-facilitates a women's empowerment group with CAASA and FCC. This group utilizes the evidenced based curriculum Seeking Safety and addresses a variety of issues from substance use, domestic violence, sexual assault, healthy relationships, boundaries, coping skill development, living skills etc.

#### Access to Recovery (ATR)

ATR continues to be available providing vouchers to individuals in recovery from substance abuse for the purchase of recovery support services. This program assists our clients with transportation by providing cab cards or gas cards. It also assists in paying a percentage of treatment fees for clients that are uninsured or underinsured.

AUGUST 2018

#### Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT)

SBIRT is a comprehensive, integrated, public health approach to the delivery of early intervention and treatment services for persons with substance use disorders, as well as those who are at risk of developing these disorders.

- Screening quickly assesses the severity of substance use and identifies the appropriate level of treatment.
- Brief intervention focuses on increasing insight and awareness regarding substance use and motivation toward behavioral change.
- Referral to treatment provides those identified as needing more extensive treatment with access to specialty care.

SBIRT was implemented within the WIC clinics to assist in providing an access point to clients who may be identified as high-risk. This can allow a more integrated care for all clients.

In FY17, the Behavioral Health Department provided 7,347 client contact sessions!

Utility assistance is offered in all seven counties through the Family Development Centers.

Utility assistance includes Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and

crisis assistance for prevention of utility disconnection.

LIHEAP is a federally-funded program that has been established to help qualifying low-income lowa homeowners and renters pay for a portion of their primary heating costs for the winter heating season. By doing so, households can reduce the risk of health and safety problems—such as illness, fire or eviction. The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel, and type of housing. In an attempt to reach all qualifying households, the Development Department provides additional local intake sites in communities within our seven county coverage area! In Fiscal Year 2017, we offered local intake sites in Exira, Lake City, Coon Rapids, Manning, Adel, Dallas Center, Waukee, Churdan, Grand Junction, and Stuart, in addition to accepting applications at our Family Development Centers in each county.



In Fiscal Year 2017, New Opportunities paid over \$1.4 million toward the heating costs of 3,270 low-income households!

Crisis assistance for utilities is available to families requesting help with reconnecting utility service and preventing utility disconnection, as well as assistance with furnace repair and replacement. Households who utilize LIHEAP are eligible to receive additional crisis assistance.

### **HEALTH**



**WIC** (Women, Infants, & Children) is a supplemental nutrition program for babies, children under the age of 5, pregnant women, breastfeeding women, and women who have had a baby in the last 6 months. **1676** women and children received WIC benefits in Audubon, Calhoun, Carroll, Dallas, Greene, Guthrie and Sac counties.

WIC helps provide healthy foods, nutrition education, and referral to other healthcare agencies. 2017 brought the roll out of eWIC! Participants receive three months of benefits on their eWIC card and shop their local participating grocery store to purchase approved foods. This change has made it more convenient for participants to receive and redeem their benefits.

**311** pregnant and post-partum women were seen through the **Maternal Health Program** for health education during and after their pregnancies in Audubon, Carroll and Guthrie counties. **86.5%** sought care with their OB provider in the 1st trimester. Maternal Health staff assists with:

Medical & Dental Assessment

Health & Nutrition Education

Care Coordination

Psychosocial Screening & Referral

Assistance with Plans for Delivery



816 children ages birth to 19 were provided services through the Child Health Program. 79.8% reported a medical home. The Child Health program provides presumptive eligibility services for children who may appear to be eligible for Medicaid, or hawk-i, and informing services for children who are newly Medicaid enrolled. Care coordination services help families' access regular health care check-ups for their children through medical and dental homes. We also link families to other community-based services based upon need. The Child Health program strives to assure that children receive periodic comprehensive health screening services that include the following: health history, physical exam, vision and hearing screening, dental screening and education, immunizations, developmental/behavioral screening, nutrition assessment, and education, laboratory tests (including blood lead testing), and anticipatory guidance.

Family Planning and Community Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention Program (CAPP) provided 3928 middle/high school/college students with science-based sexuality information including having a healthy relationship, preventing unplanned pregnancies, reducing sexually transmitted infections and being safe with social media. Teen Events were held in several area schools through a collaboration of community providers. Teens were able to participate in activities and win prizes by



participating in topics such as: drinking and driving, healthy eating, healthy relationships and dating, STD education and pregnancy prevention, smoking and many more.
